#### INTRODUCTION

A primary purpose stated within the BSN program mission at Florida State College at Jacksonville is to prepare nurses for career advancement and management of evidence-based practiced care for individuals, families, and the community. BSN program goals and outcomes are aligned with this purpose and further define how the program is evaluated. Student Learning Outcomes define expectations for student achievement during the program. Graduate Competencies define expectations to be achieved at program completion.

Each course within the BSN program of study is designed to encourage professional growth by building on current nursing education and experience. Course material provides a foundation of baccalaureate nursing education so that each graduate is prepared to be a care provider, care manager, and member of the nursing profession. Clinical practicum hours typically focus on a clinical practice, educational or leadership topic using professional guidelines and standards to promote best practice. BSN faculty members challenge each student to use critical thinking, cultural sensitivity, and interdisciplinary collaboration in the management of individuals, families, groups and populations.

BSN course content and learning activities are influenced by the *Essentials of Baccalaureate Education* (AACN, 2008) found in Appendix A along with professional ethics statements and educational recommendations published by the American Nurses Association (ANA), the Institute of Medicine (IOM), and the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN). Faculty members combine these resources with content from textbooks and professional resources to assure that instructional material is current and relevant. A listing of most frequently used resources can be found in Appendix A.

The BSN program offers both online/synchronous online and blended/hybrid course delivery. Blended delivery and synchronous online combines traditional classroom-based learning with structured learning opportunities that can be accomplished outside the classroom. Access to either online or blended learning is offered to respect student time and learning preferences.

COVID 19 ALERT. During 2021-2022 we may continue to experience modifications in classroom learning to safeguard student/faculty safety.

Students and faculty members may be resuming limited activities on campus or clinical sites for practicum experiences. Students and faculty should not be present if they have current COVID 19 symptoms and/or positive test results. For those who have tested positive for COVID 19, they must be able to provide 2 negative results before returning

to any physical learning activity. \*\*\*Please refer to the Student Return to Campus Guide\*\*\*

Any student that is directly exposed to COVID-19 must have a COVID-19 test completed 3-5 days post exposure. If the test is negative and the student IS NOT experiencing any signs or symptoms of COVID-19 they can return to any physical learning activities. If the test is positive, they must provide 2 negative test results before returning to any physical learning activity. \*\*\*Please refer to the Student Return to Campus Guide\*\*\*

Students, faculty and staff on campus are mandated to wear a face mask and maintain social distancing during face to face interactions.

Student success will require computer and internet access to facilitate communication and to post written assignments on time. The physical location of all classroom based learning takes place on the Deerwood Campus and BSN faculty members coordinate classroom learning so that time spent on campus is used efficiently. When safety concerns impact campus-based learning, all sections of all courses will move to an online schedule for the duration of the course that semester.

Each student is encouraged to take advantage of the many resources at Florida State College at Jacksonville. Resources within the Library and Learning Commons (LLC) are available six days a week and academic resources are electronically available at any time. Several electronic data bases provide current full-text journal articles to assist with assignments and projects. Students are also encouraged to participate in BSN Department, Campus and College committees. These types of experiences contribute to personal development and will enhance professional growth.

The RN to BSN Program committees will have student representatives from each term. Student representatives may be selected by faculty, classmates, or through volunteering. The student representatives are selected for each term in the fall semester. The student representatives speak for their respective term classmates on identified RN to BSN Program committees.

#### **Background of the BSN Program**

In 2006, a leadership team at Florida State College at Jacksonville, North Campus, began exploring the prospect of offering a Bachelor of Science degree in nursing. This endeavor was prompted by local interest from area hospitals and health care agencies which were facing severe shortages of highly qualified nurses, especially in critical care and high acuity areas. The Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program initially focused on critical care specialization and the first group of students enrolled in 2008.

The decision was made to offer a more standard Bachelor of Science in Nursing program in 2010. Starting with the fall semester, a revised program curriculum now offers a generalist foundation that prepares practicing nurses to achieve baccalaureate level competencies in professional communication, critical thinking, leadership and management, evidence-based practice and teaching and learning.

The 2015-2016 academic year introduced more program changes. Incoming students with a current RN license were no longer required to document one year of professional nursing experience and were better prepared academically because of required speech and statistics courses. Both online and blended course delivery were offered in selected courses, and every BSN course was designed to accept both classroom-based and online assignments. All program changes were implemented to better support student progress toward degree completion.

In Fall 2016, a revised curriculum was implemented that streamlined the program from 123 to 120 credit hours and made the program consistent with state initiatives for bachelor programs. The BSN program remains a program of part time study with courses offered online and hybrid to accommodate practicing RNs. The BSN courses in the new curriculum can be completed over 3 semesters in 1 year, but may be extended if desired.

Starting Spring 2019, a revised curriculum now includes general education courses so that newly graduated RN's can quickly be admitted into the program. Background checks, drug testing, and health information including documented immunity titers will be no longer required of all students yet continue to be required for those students choosing to work within a clinical facility for any of their assignments.

#### **Global Scholars Distinction Program**

Starting in Spring 2021, the FSCJ RN to BSN degree program began offering the Global Scholars Distinction program, a research-based approach to internationalizing education through globally focused coursework as well as campus and community-based learning activities and experiences. Many of the requirements for the program are built within the BSN courses. More information will be provided in the NUR 3805 class

and is also located in the BSN Learning Community. All students are encouraged to participate in the program, as it will prepare them to practice in a globalized society and may give them an advantage for future employment.

#### **IDEAS Grant**

The Bachelor of Science in Nursing (B.S.N.) degree program was also awarded the Increase and Diversify Education Abroad for U.S. Students (IDEAS) grant from the Department of State. This grant will allow RN to B.S.N degree seeking students the chance to virtually study abroad. The activities will be available to second semester students in NUR 3846 in the Fall of 2021 and third semester students in the Spring of 2022. The intent of the program is to have students

- 1. Build capacity to bring virtual global studies to FSCJ students
- 2. Increase international awareness, cultural engagement of students particularly those in healthcare
- 3. Establish Study Abroad Opportunities with a focus on underrepresented populations

#### Virtual Exchange Sessions

BSN students will have the opportunity to participate in virtual exchange activities with other students from other nursing and allied health programs from around the world. More information on these activities will be presented in NUR 3805.

#### MISSION STATEMENTS

#### Florida State College at Jacksonville

#### **Bachelor of Science in Nursing Program**

The mission of the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program is to develop Registered Nurses to provide quality health care in multicultural environments, promote inter-professional collaboration, and engage in lifelong learning to serve the diverse community with intelligence, compassion, and sociocultural sensitivity. The graduate is prepared to use critical thinking and theory synthesis for career advancement and management of evidence-based practiced care for individuals, families, and the community across multiple healthcare settings.

#### **BSN PROGRAM PHILOSOPHY**

Nursing is a caring, scholarly and science-based profession that combines the richness of a solid base in liberal arts education with interdisciplinary knowledge from the fields of leadership, management, policy and finance. The BSN program at Florida State College at Jacksonville offers a baccalaureate nursing education program that prepares graduates for nursing practice that is evidence-based, demonstrates commitment to the nursing profession and values life-long learning through the pursuit of graduate education and/or career mobility. Beliefs and values related to nursing practice and nursing education are combined with the traditionally interrelated concepts of person, health, nursing and environment to reflect the faculty's approach to program curriculum and student learning. There are central and interrelated concepts within the program's nursing philosophy representing the nursing metaparadigm (global perspective). These concepts reflect values, frame beliefs, and guide the approach to nursing practice and nursing education.

Four major concepts within nursing's metaparadigm are used to frame and guide nursing education in the BSN program.

• **Human Beings:** Each person is a complex, unique, biopsychosocial and cognitive organism that has unlimited potential for growth and development. Human beings exist as biological individuals with strong interactive psychological, social, and spiritual bonds to those around them; they can survive by themselves but thrive within families, groups and communities. Their continuous interaction with internal and external environments is reflected through action and thought.

Consistent with humanistic learning theory, there is an assumption that all human beings have an innate desire to survive and grow in a positive way. Life-long learning is both personally and professionally oriented. This conceptual definition promotes mutual respect regarding human differences and prepares students to design holistic and collaborative care meeting identified needs throughout the life span.

• **Health:** This concept represents a multidimensional and holistic state that changes in response to the environment. Perception of health is subjective and dynamic; it is located on a continuum that is subject to socio-cultural beliefs and influences. This conceptual perspective guides students in offering high quality, competent, ethical and culturally competent care within their scope of practice. This concept encourages students to recognize the many variations of perceived health as they collaborate with others to promote the maximum potential of individuals, families and communities.

- **Nursing:** The discipline of professional nursing addresses clinicians who strive to provide safe, high quality, evidence-based care to a culturally diverse population with respect and dignity. The profession of nursing values life-long learning to address increasingly complex health care delivery systems and considers the interaction of biological, psychological, spiritual, cultural, ethical and socioeconomic variables in the delivery of nursing care. Using this conceptual definition as a foundation, faculty work with students to apply knowledge from the liberal arts, sciences, informatics, and the body of knowledge within nursing and other health related disciplines to promote an interdisciplinary, collaborative and meaningful educational experience.
- Environment: The environment is both external and internal and encompasses more than physical surroundings. The perception of environment is comprised of physical features, psychological and social phenomena, and spiritual dimensions. These multiple environments are overlapping, dynamic and complex; they consist not of just the perceived present, but of the remembered past and anticipated future. Environmental perceptions are continuously interacting with each other and with human beings as individuals, families, groups, communities, and populations. Students are encouraged to explore how human beings respond to internal and external stimuli as they assess, plan, implement, and evaluate care.

#### **BSN PROGRAM GOALS AND OUTCOMES**

#### **BSN Program Goals**

BSN Program Goals guide administration and faculty members as they plan, design, and implement the BSN program of study. Program Goals are:

- 1. To prepare registered nurse graduates to design evidence-based care for increasingly complex patients, families, and communities.
- 2. To promote competence in critical thinking, cultural sensitivity, and ethical decision making.
- 3. To prepare BSN graduates to assume educational and leadership roles in professional nursing practice.
- 4. To prepare BSN graduates for post-baccalaureate education.

#### **BSN Program Outcomes**

BSN Program Outcomes function as quantitative indicators of program success. Program Outcomes are:

- 1. Seventy (70%) percent of students in the BSN program will graduate within six semesters.
- Eighty percent (80%) of BSN graduates who respond to the End of Program Survey will report satisfaction with the quality of the BSN educational program.
- 3. Eighty percent (80%) of BSN graduates who respond to the End of Program Survey will report job employment.

#### **BSN Student Learning Outcomes**

BSN Student Learning Outcomes are the broad, measurable outcomes that prepare students to become competent care providers, care managers and members of the nursing profession. BSN Student Learning Outcomes are achieved through course work and clinical practicum experiences. Graduates are expected to achieve competency in these five areas.

- 1. **Communication**: Utilize effective, culturally sensitive, and ethical communication methods to collaborate with patients, families, communities and health care providers. Communication methods include oral, written, and electronic formats that promote sending and receiving information.
- 2. **Critical Thinking**: Systematically review and analyze current information to guide professional nursing practice. Comprehensive analysis will often require inter- and intra-professional collaboration.
- 3. **Leadership and Management**: Synthesize leadership and management principles to promote professional development and optimal patient-focused outcomes. Scope of professional development ranges from self to the entire profession. Patient-focused outcomes may be individual, family, or community oriented.
  - **Evidence-Based Practice**: Develop a consistent problem-solving approach to clinical practice that integrates current evidence, clinical expertise, and individual/family/community preferences and values. This working definition of EBP comes from Melnyk and Fineout-Overholt (2019) in *Evidence-based Practice in Nursing & Healthcare: A Guide to Best Practice*.
- 4. **Teaching and Learning**: Integrate principles of teaching and learning in professional nursing practice. Best practices in both teaching and learning are evaluated as they relate to a variety of situations.

#### **BSN PROGRAM ADMISSION CRITERIA**

To meet the minimum requirements for consideration for acceptance to the B.S.N. program, applicants must satisfy the <u>bachelor's degree general admission</u> requirements. The B.S.N. program has rolling admissions throughout the term; a bachelor's degree admissions application may be submitted at any time throughout the term. Apply online at <u>apply.fscj.edu</u>.

#### Additionally, applicants must:

- 1. Have earned an Associate of Science in Nursing (A.S.N.) from a regionally accredited college or university and completed a minimum of 60 transferable college credit hours with a GPA of 2.0 or above. All general education courses and nursing foundation courses used to satisfy the Associate of Science Degree in Nursing must have a grade of "C" or better to count toward the bachelor's degree.
- 2. Provide official transcripts from their A.S.N. program.
- 3. Have a minimum 2.0 GPA from their A.S.N. program.
- 4. Provide documentation of the following:
- A copy of current Florida Nursing License or license in the state where student will conduct practicum activities.
- Evidence of current CPR certification
- Completion of 30 credit hours of General Education course with a grade of "C" or better (ENC 1101 or ENC 1101C, MAC 1105 or higher level MAC prefix course or MAP 2302, BSC 2085C, BSC 2086C, CHM 1020 or CHM 1025C or CHM 1032C or CHM 2045C or CHM 2046C, MCB 2010C, DEP 2004, PSY 1012 and 3 credit hours of Humanities) prior to the first day of enrollment in the B.S.N. program.
- The Florida legislature has modified the Civic Literacy Graduation Requirement for Florida College System students. Senate Bill 1108 amends s. 1007.25, Florida Statutes (F.S.), to require associate in arts and baccalaureate students initially entering a Florida College System (FCS) institution in the 2021-22 academic year, and thereafter, to complete a course AND pass an assessment to demonstrate competency in civic literacy.

Prior to conducting practicum hours at some healthcare facilities, students must meet affiliation agreement requirements for that facility. Most of the time, students are able

to complete their practicum objectives in settings that do not require additional records; however, if needed, the additional records may include:

- 1. Completed criminal background check and drug screening through Florida State College at Jacksonville.
- 2. Current PPD or chest x-ray as appropriate.
- 3. Tetanus vaccination within the last ten years.
- 4. Positive titers for rubeola, rubella, varicella, mumps, and hepatitis B or proof of immunization.
- 5. Completed Health Certificate and Physical Exam forms.
- 6. Health insurance.

#### BSN PROGRAM PROGRESSION REQUIREMENTS

- 1. A minimum all-college cumulative grade point average of 2.0 is to be maintained throughout and is necessary to progress in the BSN program.
- 2. Students are expected to work with the BSN program nursing advisor to review required coursework needed before completing the BSN degree.
- 3. Continuous enrollment is expected of students admitted to the BSN program unless exceptional circumstances exist. Courses are designed so that coursework during each semester builds on previous coursework. Exceptional circumstances will be addressed by the Dean/Associate Dean of Nursing.
- 4. Students must maintain evidence of current RN licensure and BCLS (Basic Cardiac Life Support) certification for Healthcare Professionals (CPR of adult, child and infant with AED). ACLS (Advanced Cardiac Life Support) certification will be accepted for the BCLS requirement.
  - 5. Students will follow the Professional Guidelines used in the BSN Program at Florida State College at Jacksonville (Appendix A), the American Nurses Association (ANA) Code of Ethics (Appendix B), the ANA Standards for Professional Nursing Practice, the Rules and Regulations of the Florida Board of Nursing (located on their website at http://floridasnursing.gov/resources/ and the requirements of each agency where assigned for practicum experiences.
- 6. Students with disabilities should refer to the Florida State College at Jacksonville Catalog for a listing of available support services. Any student declaring a disability must work with the Office of Counseling/Advising for Students with

Disabilities in order to receive an accommodation. The phone number is (904) 766-6784.

7. Adherence to the Substance Abuse Policy (Appendix D) is expected.

#### **BACCALAUREATE GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS**

Requirements for baccalaureate graduation at Florida State College at Jacksonville are stated in the College Catalog and are summarized on the following page. Twelve (12) of the eighteen (18) BSN General Education credit hours must be completed before beginning the BSN program of study and those courses are designated with an asterisk (\*). The state of Florida requires coursework in a foreign language prior to earning a baccalaureate degree, and options to meet this requirement are explained in the College Catalog located at <a href="http://catalog.fscj.edu/index.php">http://catalog.fscj.edu/index.php</a> (2017-2018 catalog)

#### **Graduation Ceremonies**

The BSN Program participates in the division-wide Nursing Pinning Ceremony at the end of every semester, honoring all graduating nursing students. BSN students meeting eligibility requirements for graduation at the end of the semester in which the pinning ceremony is held are invited to participate. To participate in the pinning ceremony, and have their name shown on the pinning program, the RN to BSN student must be within nine (9) credit hours from graduation in their last semester including pre-requisites for a Bachelor of Science degree and the core nursing courses. Any questions about eligibility should be directed to the BSN Advisor.

BSN graduates are invited to participate in the college-wide Commencement Ceremony held annually in May. This ceremony is traditionally held at the Jacksonville Veterans Memorial Arena. BSN students meeting eligibility requirements for graduation are invited to participate.

Reliable and consistent computer and Internet access is encouraged to successfully participate in and complete online courses. Ensure that your computer meets the minimum system requirements noted below and on the Florida State College at Jacksonville <a href="Online Learning site">Online Learning site</a>. It is a good idea to check your computer at the beginning of each course and a couple of times throughout the term to ensure you have all the necessary software and plug-ins to use the Blackboard online system and course features. Navigate to the Guides.CanvasLMS.com and choose the *Browser Checker* link. Review the results and interpretations to determine your system's compatibility and readiness.

Please note that you will need to turn off your pop-up blocker to use all features of this online course.

Each student is encouraged to take advantage of the many resources at Florida State College at Jacksonville. Resources within the Library and Learning Commons (LLC) are available six days a week and academic resources are electronically available at any time. Several electronic data bases provide current full-text journal articles to assist with assignments and projects. Students are also encouraged to participate in BSN Department, Campus and College committees. #### **BSN POLICIES AND EXPECTATIONS**

#### **RN-BSN Learning Expectations**

The faculty value your role as an RN and will guide you as you expand your professional role. As a peer on the healthcare team, your verbal and written skills will be refined as well as your teaching and coaching for improvement strategies. Our goal is to transform good nurses into excellent nurses.

#### **Changes in Policies and Procedures**

New BSN students will receive an updated Bachelor of Science in Nursing Student Handbook at the beginning of program enrollment for the academic year of enrollment. All BSN students have access to an updated handbook which incorporates any previous program or policy changes when changes are made or routinely at the beginning of each academic year. This handbook is uploaded at the beginning of each semester into the Introduction Module within Canvas in the event of a policy change affecting current students enrolled in the BSN program, students will be notified in class and in writing.

#### Change of Name and/or Address

Students are responsible for notifying the Dean or Associate Deans of the BSN Program of address changes and name changes as soon as they occur. Students must also have their records updated in the college records by contacting any Student Success office.

#### **FSCJ Communications**

Students are required to obtain a Florida State College at Jacksonville e-mail address. This address is the only one that will be used for electronic communications with students. Additionally, this is the only address that will be used to provide students with access to "online" resources. (Appendix G).

BSN faculty, staff, and Nursing Dean/Associate Deans are available by phone and email during regular business hours but email has become the College's preferred method of communication. Information delivered using postal mail is not used as frequently. Your information regarding financial aid, records, and student services has transitioned from mail to email, and it will be delivered only to your FSCJ account.

Emergency communications may not be able to be facilitated through usual phone and internet connections. Official College announcements will be available through WOKV-AM 690/WOKV-FM 104.5 local radio during periods of natural disaster or crisis impacting students and employees.

#### **Course Options**

All courses in the BSN program are offered as online- all activities online meaning they are asynchronous learning. The official definition of this modality is: Learning and instruction that does not occur in the same place or at the same time.

Students are not required to participate in any classroom-based learning activities but are encouraged to attend when offered if desired. However, faculty may request or invite you to attend one or two classroom-based sessions, such as a formal presentation.

In order to obtain service learning hours or practicum hours, you are required to participate in activities that are not online. Opportunities are provided each semester and students may request other opportunities, but must request and obtain approval by their instructor prior to participating to receive points toward their grade.

Faculty members are available to online and hybrid students by appointment for individual face-to-face meetings or phone conferences, as well as office hours online or on campus.

All BSN courses are offered in each semester, and may be offered in various semester lengths. Courses may be offered over a full 15 week semester, a shorter 7 week semester, or sometimes a modified 12-14 week semester, based on the college calendar. Courses delivery using varied lengths of time are offered to help the student progress through the BSN program with minimal barriers.

#### **Course Expectations**

Within each BSN course, students need to review each of the following during the first week of the course:

- Course Syllabus
- Course Description
- Learning Outcomes
- Technology Requirements
- Learning Communities
- Assignments, including individual, partner and group//team project activities
- Grading
- Calendar of Activities
- Announcements

By being enrolled in the BSN course at Florida State College at Jacksonville, you agree to abide by all the terms and conditions of this course and accept responsibility and accountability for the items listed above.

#### **Group Assignments**

During the BSN program, all students are expected to participate in group assignments as directed by course faculty. Group assignments may include, but are not limited to, projects, presentations, debates, and discussion forums. Group assignments promote team-work, communication, collaboration and respect among peers, all of which are outcomes congruent with the FSCJ and BSN program expectations.

Grades for group assignments: Generally, group members receive the same grade for an assignment; however, faculty members have the option of adjusting group members' individual grades based on peer input. If peer input is a component of the overall

assignment grade, the criteria and associated grading rubric will be provided to students before the assignment due date. Group assignments will not exceed 30% of the overall course grade.

#### Grading

Florida State College's grading system is designed to evaluate the performance of students as fairly and equitably as possible (see Grading System information within the College Catalog).

1. The grading scale in the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) Program is:

A = 90-100% B = 80-89% C = 70-79%

BSN students earning a course grade below 70% will not be able to progress in the curriculum program of study.

- 2. A passing grade will be received when the student meets the objectives of each nursing course and is in compliance with all course requirements and policies (as well as BSN Program and College Policies).
- 3. End of term grades will be posted in Artemis, the College web-based information platform. Grades reflected in the **Canvas system are unofficial**, but are posted to help communicate grade information.
- 4. Students who fail to meet all course requirements will receive one (1) of three (3) instructor assigned grades. These grades are:
  - F Failure (below 70)
  - FN Failure for non-attendance
  - I Incomplete work (see College Catalog for instructions governing eligibility and removal of this grade)

These grades will be assigned at the discretion of the faculty member and in accordance with individual course and college policies.

5. Due to security concerns, faculty members are not allowed to issue grades by telephone or e-mail.

#### 6. Repeating the Course

If you receive a C or higher grade in any BSN course, you may not repeat the same course to improve a grade. If you fail a course, you have only one additional attempt to pass the course. Withdrawals will follow the college policy in the college catalog.

Withdrawals will follow the college policy in the college catalog, which states "You have only three total attempts in any course, including the original grade, repeat grades, and withdrawals. Upon the third attempt in a course, you must be given an "A," "B," "C," "D" or "F"."

#### Attendance

- 1. Student participation is expected in all scheduled classes, online activities and practicum experiences. In the event a student fails a course with a practicum component (NUR 3636C and NUR 4169C), both components (class and practicum) must be repeated. Multiple absences from classes or online activities may jeopardize a student's progress in the course and/or the BSN program. Documentation may be requested to validate safe return to program of study.
- 2. Students assume full responsibility for all content covered during their absence from class/and or practicum experience, and will be held to the same level of performance as that of other students

#### **Student Evaluation**

- 1. Assignments, written or otherwise, will be evaluated using assignment-specific criteria. Criteria will include evaluation of substantive content, organization and progression ideas, and adherence to basic guidelines for writing set forth the by the American Psychological Association (APA).
- 2. Oral presentation assignments will be evaluated using general rubric or an assignment-specific rubric. This rubric will include evaluation of substantive content, organization, use of audio-visual aids to enhance learning, and presentation style.
- 3. The BSN program grading scale will be applied.
- 4. Practicum evaluations will be based on type of experience. Practice experiences are defined as "...experiential learning in any setting where health care is delivered or health is influenced that allow for and require the student to integrate new practice related knowledge and skills"

  (http://www.aacn.nche.edu/aacn-publications/white-papers/RN-BSN-White-Paper.pdf). Practicum experiences are primarily indirect care activities, such as collaborative clinical practicum projects, educational programs, supervisory/managerial projects, or participation in planning and evaluating

care. Evaluations will be based on identified learning outcomes designed in each course and with each student.

- 5. Student assignments are intended to be completed on or before the due date. Each course faculty member will determine course policies regarding written assignments and presentations, missed assignments, late assignments, etc. and communicate these policies using the course syllabus. Specific late penalties will be posted by the faculty member in each course syllabus.
- 6. Participation in end-of-course surveys and end-of-program surveys is an expectation in order to continuously improve course design and the overall BSN program.

#### The successful BSN graduate will:

- 1. Complete 120-128 credit hours of specified college-level credit courses in the degree program. This includes 48 credit hours in General Education, 42 credit hours within the Associate in Science Degree in Nursing program, and 30 credit hours of Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing coursework. There may also be 8 credit hours in foreign language credits required for graduation, depending on whether the student has satisfied this requirement in high school or at another regionally accredited institution of higher learning. The foreign language requirement is met by taking two years of the same foreign language in high school or eight credits of the same foreign language in college.
- 2. Have a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of at least 2.0 on a 4.0 scale in all nursing program coursework and other required courses.
- 3. Have met all other Florida State College at Jacksonville requirements and time lines.

#### Confidentiality

Any breach of confidentiality can be grounds for dismissal from the BSN program at Florida State College at Jacksonville. Students will be required to sign a legally binding confidentiality statement before beginning practicum experiences and may be required to sign additional statements at each health site. This is in conjunction with the federal law, HIPAA.

1. All client information, verbal or written, is confidential. Failure to protect patient's rights jeopardizes the BSN nursing program and/or Florida State

- College at Jacksonville and could make both the college and student subject to litigation by the client, their family, and/or the health facility.
- 2. Students are responsible for protecting any client information to which they have access. Information is not to be left in client rooms, on desks, in classrooms, in the cafeteria, or out for public viewing. Nothing with a client's name affixed in any manner is to be removed from the unit.
- 3. Students shall not identify clients, health providers, communities, or other persons by name in their assignments, projects, or other exercises for learning purposes.
- 4. Students shall not discuss clients, staff or care issues in public (i.e. with friends or family or in public places such as cafeterias, elevators, restaurants, etc.)
- 5. Students shall not discuss client problems with other clients, patient family members, or any other person.
- 6. Students shall not discuss their personal problems with clients.

#### Witnessing Legal Documents

It is recognized that BSN students are licensed RNs, but in the student role they are not permitted to witness legal documents nor take medical orders over the telephone due to the potential for role conflict and/or perceived conflict of interest.

#### Illness

- 1. Students who have been absent due to hospitalization or other serious health condition may be required to bring a written doctor's statement verifying clearance to return to the classroom or when applicable, return to a practicum setting.
- 2. Any student reporting for a classroom or clinical practicum experience who appears ill or injured may be sent home at the discretion of the faculty.

#### Student Accident/Injury Procedures

It is each student's responsibility to immediately inform their faculty member of any accidents or injuries that occur during instructional/practicum activities. For specifics, please refer to Appendix E.

#### Potential Infectious and Environmental Hazards in Nursing Practice

It is the responsibility of each BSN student to adhere to health facility policies and the guidelines on *Standard Precautions* of the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Prevention (United States Public Health Service) during practicum experiences.

Any student who experiences exposure to blood or other body fluids directly or indirectly while in a health facility must notify the instructor immediately and will be advised by the instructor to follow the CDC guidelines for exposure, as well as those of the assigned health agency.

The student must also complete an incident report that is filed with the College's risk management office (see Appendix E and Appendix F).

#### **Exit Interviews**

Each student exiting a course for any reason is requested to have an exit interview with the Nursing Dean/Associate Dean. The exit interview is recommended in order to be considered for re-instatement to the BSN program.

#### **Religious Holidays**

Reasonable accommodation for religiously observant students from all faiths will be made on an individual basis.

#### **Lactation Accommodations**

FSCJ North Campus has a designated Lactation Room on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor C building for nursing mothers. The room is locked and requires an access code. Please contact the Nursing Office if and when this room is needed.

#### STUDENT ACADEMIC DISHONESTY

ACADEMIC DISHONESTY IS CONSIDERED A SERIOUS OFFENSE AND IS EXPRESSLY PROHIBITED. This policy includes written assignments, presentations, projects, course examinations, and all testing.

The Florida State College at Jacksonville's catalog statement regarding procedures for handling alleged academic state the following:

#### **Procedures for Handling Alleged Academic Dishonesty**

Academic dishonesty, in any form, is expressly prohibited by the rules of the District Board of Trustees of Florida State College at Jacksonville.

As used herein, academic dishonesty incorporates the following.

- Cheating, which is defined as the giving or taking of any information or material with the intent of wrongfully aiding one's self or another in academic work considered in the determination of course grade or the outcome of a standardized test.
- **Plagiarism**, which is defined as the act of stealing or passing off as one's own work the words, ideas or conclusions of another as if the work submitted were the product of one's own thinking rather than an idea or product derived from another source.

- Any other form of inappropriate behavior which may include but is not limited
  to: falsifying records or data, lying, unauthorized copying, tampering, abusing or
  otherwise unethically using computer or other stored information, and any other
  act or misconduct which may reasonably be deemed to be a part of this heading.

Any student alleged to have committed any act of academic dishonesty as defined herein shall be entitled to due process as defined in District Board of Trustees' Rule 6Hx7–2.18 prior to the administration of disciplinary action including suspension and dismissal.

If a student is determined by a professor to be lying, stealing, or cheating, the student may be <u>recommended for permanent dismissal</u> from the BSN program.

#### COMPLAINT PROCESS

The established protocol for handling student problems/issues in the BSN program is:

**FIRST**, the student must consult with the course faculty member. If the complaint is not related to any course or faculty member, then the complaint can be initially directed to the Nursing Dean/Associate Deans.

**SECOND**, if no resolution in the issues is achieved, the student may request to meet with the Nursing Dean/Associate Deans.

**THIRD**, if no resolution is achieved, the student may request the Nursing Dean/Associate Deans to arrange a meeting with Associate Provost of the College.

#### PROFESSIONAL RESOURCES and GUIDELINES

#### **Essentials of Baccalaureate Education for Professional Nursing Practice**

This document describes the curricular elements and educational framework needed in a baccalaureate nursing program, emphasizing such concepts as patient-centered care, inter-professional teams, evidence-based practice, quality improvement, informatics, cultural sensitivity and professionalism. This document is endorsed by the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) and assists in defining the expected outcomes for graduates of a baccalaureate nursing program so that generalist baccalaureate prepared nurses can assume the roles of provider of care, designer/manager/coordinator of care, and member of the nursing profession. The BSN program of study uses this document to guide and frame the curriculum.

#### **Code for Nurses**

The revised ANA Code of Ethics for Nurses serves as a guide to standards of conduct, relationships, and practice. Adherence to the code by all students is expected. A copy of the code can be found in Appendix B.

#### Professional Behavior and Demeanor

Students in the BSN program will comply with the academic regulations and requirements as stated in the College catalog and program policies of the Florida State College at Jacksonville.

#### **Dress Code**

The dress code is designed to provide guidelines on appropriate dress for the professional nurse. Students are expected to arrive for clinical practicum activities on time and in the appropriate attire. Students not adhering to the guidelines will not be permitted to remain in the clinical practicum setting and may incur a clinical practicum absence as a result. If a health agency has a dress code that is more restrictive than the following, the stricter dress code will apply.

#### 1. Florida State College at Jacksonville Nametag and Photo ID Badge

Florida State College at Jacksonville nametag must be clearly visible at all times during practicum activities. If a lab coat or sweater is worn, the nametag must be attached to the coat or sweater. The nametag is to be worn on the collar or lapel of the uniform or lab coat.

#### 2. Lab Coats or College Polo Shirt

When students are required to go into a health facility, appropriate identification must be worn with professional attire. Professional attire includes a lab coat with Florida State College at Jacksonville logo or worn with either a nursing uniform or traditional business attire, or a Florida State College at Jacksonville nursing polo shirt with full length (waist to ankle) khaki pants and closed toe shoes. Most health facilities and community settings also request that students wear a visible Florida State College at Jacksonville photo ID badge.

#### **Guidelines for Professionalism in Health Facility Settings**

#### 1. Orientation to Health Agencies

If practicum activities are conducted in a facility that requires orientation, then students must attend orientation sessions and provide course instructors with documentation of attendance and completion of in-services and other requirements (such as background checks, immunizations, and CPR training, etc.), as outlined in affiliation agreements. The majority of local acute care facilities utilize *My Clinical Exchange*, a cloud-based repository of required documentation needed before students are allowed to participate in any clinical activities.

#### 2. Illnesses and Injuries

Students are not permitted to participate in clinical practicum activities if they are ill or injured. At the discretion of the faculty member, students with infectious processes or incapacitating injuries will be evaluated for continuance in the program. Clearance from a physician must be presented if requested.

#### Supporting Title IX at FSCJ

**Title IX** is a federal civil rights law in the U.S. that was passed as part of the <u>Education Amendments of 1972</u>. This federal law prohibits discrimination based on gender in education programs or activities. A student cannot be discriminated against based on pregnancy, childbirth, false pregnancy, termination of pregnancy, or recovery from any of these conditions.

Within the nursing programs at FSCJ, women requiring excused absences due to pregnancy or childbirth are provided with reasonable accommodations but must still adhere to the overall policies on classroom and clinical absences.

## AMERICAN NURSES ASSOCIATION CODE OF ETHICS FOR NURSES

- The nurse practices with compassion and respect for the inherent dignity, worth and unique attributes of every person.
- The nurse's primary commitment is to the patient, whether an individual, family, group, community or population.
- The nurse promotes, advocates for, and protects the rights, health, and safety of the patient.
- The nurse has authority, accountability, and responsibility for nursing practice; makes decision; and takes action consistent with the obligation to provide optimal patient care.
- The nurse owes the same duties to self as to others, including the responsibility to promote health and safety, preserve wholeness of character and integrity, maintain competence, and continue personal and professional growth.
- The nurse, through individual and collective effort, establishes, maintains, and improves the ethical environment of the work setting and conditions of employment that are conducive to safe, quality health care.
- The nurse, in all roles and settings, advances the profession through research and scholarly inquiry, professional standards development, and the generation of both nursing and health policy.
- The nurse collaborates with other professionals and the public to protect human rights, promote health diplomacy, and reduce health disparities.
- The profession of nursing, collectively through its professional organizations, must articulate nursing values, maintain the integrity of the profession, and integrate principles or social justice into nursing and health policy.

#### Appendix C - Substance Use/Abuse Policy

#### Florida State College at Jacksonville Bachelor Degree in Nursing Program

#### Substance Use/Abuse Policy

Florida State College at Jacksonville is committed to maintaining high standards of nursing education and practice. Safe practice includes efficient, reliable and unimpaired performance in the classroom and health setting. Students are expected to participate in nursing activities and assigned learning activities without the use of any chemical substance that could alter or impair thinking.

It is the responsibility of nursing faculty to observe student behaviors which could threaten the safety and well-being of patients. Reasonable suspicion that a student is impaired will be documented by the observing faculty member. In a clinical facility setting there may also be documentation by a licensed or certified professional at the health facility where the student is assigned. Whenever possible, such observation shall be corroborated. If unsafe behavior is documented, the following process will be implemented:

- 1. The student will be relieved of patient care responsibilities (in health facility setting or community health setting) and/or learning responsibilities (in classroom or community setting).
- 2. The student will be given an opportunity to discuss behavior with the person(s) who witnessed the behavior and the Dean/Associate Dean of Nursing. It is the student's responsibility to disclose any prescription or non-prescription medications that the student is taking as well as any other relevant medical information.
- 3. The Dean/Associate Dean of Nursing (or an alternate) will take any further action needed and prepare documentation. Additional action may include referral to the Intervention Project for Nurses (IPN) for evaluation and the institution of appropriate therapeutic measures.
- 4. Students who are accepted by the Intervention Project for Nurses must immediately advise the Dean or Associate Dean of the BSN Program of their participation in this program and comply with all IPN rules and regulations. Students who fail to comply with these requirements may be recommended for permanent dismissal from the BSN Program.

## FOR LIFE THREATENING INJURIES, Dial 9 then 911 and notify Campus Security. At North dial 766-6608.

For non-emergency injuries contact Campus Security to make a report. Additionally complete a "Student Report of Injury While Participating in School Activities" form. When a student becomes injured, the student should seek treatment using their medical insurance making sure to obtain all required authorizations required by the policy.

If the student does not have medical insurance coverage, contact the College Risk Management Department for guidance on reimbursement procedures of uncovered medical expenses.

If Risk Management cannot be reached, the student should not delay in getting the necessary medical treatment.

Students with medical insurance should seek treatment with an approved provider allowed under their insurance policy. For uninsured students, seek treatment at any CareSpot Urgent Care location. If after hours, seek treatment at the nearest emergency facility.

#### **Exposure Control Protocols**

#### Clinic

Faculty supervising the injured student will advise student to cleanse the area and treat by applying an antibacterial ointment and bandage as necessary. The Nursing Dean/Associate Dean will be informed so that he/she may have the information available for Security and the Risk

Management. In the event that the Nursing Dean/Associate Dean is unavailable the Clinic Coordinator will initiate the process. The faculty will then assist the student in filling out the attached paperwork-Blood borne Pathogen Testing Authorization and the Student Injury Form. If the source patient is still present, the faculty will explain the situation and offer testing through CareSpot. If the source patient has left the clinic the Nursing Dean/Associate Dean will contact the patient. Testing is recommended within the first two (2) hours after the exposure so this process must be expedited. Please refer to the process below:

#### Security

In the event a student or employee sustains a needle stick injury or exposure to body fluids, Security shall be notified immediately by College personnel. The person notifying Security shall advise the receiving officer the nature of the incident and the victim student or employee's name along with the location he/she will be seeking emergency/medical treatment. The injured student or employee shall be directed to seek immediate medical treatment from CareSpot (contracted medical provider) or if necessary the closest medical treatment facility. It is imperative that the injured person receives medical treatment within the first two (2) hours of the needle stick or other body fluid exposure. Security can still respond to the location of the incident and gather initial information (student and witness information) for the report and the victim student or employee can be interviewed upon his/her return to campus. Unless there are other circumstances present that require immediate response and first aid by Security Officers while awaiting Rescue, the victim student or employee will be allowed to leave and seek medical treatment immediately.

#### Risk Management

The Risk Management Department should be notified of the incident. This does not need to be done before seeking treatment.
